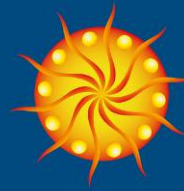

Dementia Workshops - Special Guest Speakers

Adelaide, Tuesday 2nd June 2009

Professor Dawn Brooker
PhD Consultant Clinical Psychologist

Will present a workshop on the “Enriched Opportunities Program” - a whole systems approach for intervention to improve wellbeing and occupation for persons with dementia.

WORKSHOP 1 - 9:30am to 12:30pm

Professor Brooker qualified as a clinical psychologist at the University of Birmingham in the UK in 1984. She has worked in a variety of clinical, academic and managerial posts in services for older people for over twenty-five years. She was influenced by the late Professor Tom Kitwood in his work on personhood and malignant social psychology. Whilst working as a full-time clinician, she completed her PhD in 1998 on *Improving the Quality of Services for People with Dementia*. This included an evaluation of Dementia Care Mapping (DCM) in its usefulness in improving outcomes of care for people with dementia. Following Kitwood's death she was invited to take his work on DCM forwards at the Bradford Dementia Group at the University of Bradford. In 2005 she was awarded a personal chair in recognition of her scholarship in practice development of person-centred care for people with dementia. From May 2009 she is the Director of the newly established University of Worcester Association for Dementia Studies.

Dr Helen Donovan
Consultant Clinical Psychologist, Bedfordshire and Luton Partnership NHS Trust, UK

Will present a workshop on “Cognitive Stimulation Therapy (CST) for Dementia” – a brief introduction for clinical staff interested in running CST groups for people with dementia, including background of CST research and development, content of the group programme, role-playing of some of the exercises, and discussion of the pragmatic and clinical issues that can arise when implementing the group programme.

WORKSHOP 2 - 1:30 – 4:30 pm

Dr Donovan trained as a clinical psychologist at the University of Western Australia in the early nineties and began working with older people in Perth in 1998, moving to the UK in 2002. In 2006 she worked together with Dr Aimee Spector to develop the delivery and evaluation of Cognitive Stimulation Therapy for people with dementia living in the community in the local area of the Trust, and has continued to expand and co-ordinate the local delivery of CST since that time. She is now a member of the Project Steering Committee for the SHIELD project (Support at Home: Interventions to Enhance Life in Dementia) headed by Professor Martin Orrell at University College London, which includes a multi-centre trial of Maintenance Cognitive Stimulation Therapy. She has also delivered the approved Cognitive Stimulation Therapy training to staff across a number of health and social care organisations in the UK.

WORKSHOPS ARE RECOMMENDED FOR:

Health professionals qualified and/or seeking to be qualified at a tertiary level including doctors, nurses, occupational and diversional therapists, physiotherapists, psychologists, social workers, speech pathologists, and students in these disciplines.
